"Tell me the stories of Jesus I love to hear; Things I would ask him to tell me if he were here; Scenes by the wayside, tales of the sea, Stories of Jesus, tell them to me."

As we worship during June, we will read through the whole of Mark's Gospel over the course of the month. Each week we will suggest a slightly different way of approaching the passage of scripture, hoping that this will both enrich our worship and maybe also offer us new ways of reading going forward.

This week we invite you to read as you would approach a novel, or another book you would read for pleasure. You might like to make a drink and settle yourself in a comfortable chair. Read at the speed which is comfortable to you...don't struggle to pay particular attention because this is scripture. Remember that God is with us always, and will work within us in ways both expected, and unexpected. If you can, relax. If you find you are eager to know 'the rest of the story', you may choose to read the whole gospel at one sitting this week. This will lay foundations for the weeks to come, but is by no means essential.

Read: Mark 1:1-3:35, or further as suits you

Once you have read your passage for this week, you may find that there are thoughts you want to jot down, or other reflections you want to capture – in words, doodles, drawings or other creative ways. Take some time to do that now, if it's helpful to you.

Each week we are pointed towards a theme which emerges from the set passage, and we will offer a **reflection** based on that theme<sup>2</sup>. This week that theme is Identity and Mission

Who is He? Who are they? Who are we?

Who is He – the one who's coming – as proclaimed in prophet's words?

Who is He – now calling others for a mission he's prepared?

Who is He – who shows compassion – healing 'many' of disease?

Who is He – who draws large crowds, challenging authorities?

Who are they – who first proclaimed Him – Isaiah's words, John's message clear?

Who are they - his first disciples - leaving all that they hold dear?

Who are they – the sick and troubled, finding help for various needs?

Who are they – who met objections from law-keepers, pharisees?

Who are they - the twelve apostles who would take his message out

to the others 'mothers', 'brothers' – what God's family is about? Who are we – who read the stories and who wonder at the One They portray – the long expected, the great healer, God's own Son? Who are we – to whom the precious Gospel message is revealed Of a loving, caring Saviour reaching out to those in need?

We are they who hear the challenge "Follow me" and 'fish for men"
We who now belong to Jesus,
Read Mark's stories once again.

## Let us pray:

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. Mark 1:14

Lord, we ask for your blessing on all those who preach the Gospel here and around the world, ministers and lay preachers who are in the pulpit week by week and individuals with live out their gospel in their actions. May all of us have the confidence to proclaim the Good News like John the Baptist and Jesus.

They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. Mark 1:22

Lord, we ask for your blessing on those in positions of authority or have influence on our world, political leaders, teachers, judges, police and celebrities. We pray that they will see in Jesus a model of self-giving, justice and peace.

When the scribes of the Pharisees saw that he was eating with sinners and tax-collectors, they said to his disciples, 'Why does he eat with tax-collectors and sinners?' Mark 2:16

Lord, we ask for your blessing on those who seem different to us, who have different morals and practices. Instead of judging may we be open and welcoming to those whose life is different to ours and who may be struggling with circumstances beyond their control. We pray that they will see your transforming power and accept you as Lord.

We ask all these prayers and the prayers in our heart through your Son, Jesus Christ. Amen.
